Our tradition of beautiful music continues, and we know you will find the services exceptionally beautiful and inspiring this year. Choir members have been rehearsing with our pianist, Mark Sobol, and Elana Gleason, our Cantorial Soloist. In addition, Madeleine LeBeau, who sang and provided beautiful musical accompaniment during many of our Shabbat services last year, will be singing again during the Yom Kippur afternoon service.

We will be using the *Mishkan HaNefesh* prayerbooks for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur (two books) again. We hope to have enough prayerbooks at the Temple for everyone attending in person. We will need some help before, during, and after the different services — everything from greeting congregants and ushering, helping to efficiently park cars in the lots, assisting with the Rosh Hashanah Oneg/Kiddush in memory of Mike Rein, and more. Dear friends,

There is a rabbinic teaching that when we build a home, we should leave a little bit of the house unfinished. This was to be a reminder of the destruction of the Temple. More broadly, it captures the reality that life is unfinished, that all good things are incomplete.

Shabbat is another reminder that things are never finished. Rabbi Tarfon's famous saying is, "You are not obligated to complete the work, but neither are you free to desist from it." Interestingly, while there are several words for "work" in Hebrew, the word that he chose for "work" is the precise term that the Torah uses for the tasks that we are not allowed to do on Shabbat. Since Shabbat is one of the Ten Commandments, it is a big mitzvah to leave our work unfinished once a week. Whether or not there is something major on our to-do list, it can wait a day. Think of it as a practice of knowing we can't and shouldn't try to do it all.

I was brought up to believe that you should finish what you start, no matter how long it takes. But, in an existential sense, life is all about unfinished business. The fact is that life is finite, and we need to let go of the illusion that productivity or even prioritization will somehow enable us to accomplish everything we dream of or that society expects of us.

The High Holy Days, too, remind us that our life is limited. Prayers like *Unetaneh Tokef* remind us that human life is fleeting and much is beyond our control. But, to paraphrase a saying from the technological world: our inability to complete everything in our lifetimes is not a bug in the system; it's a feature. Let me suggest that the very fact that we can't do it all, that we hand over the world to other people after us, is the thing that gives our lives meaning.

Each of us has a lot to consider during the coming holidays. May your time in thought and prayer bring you insight, inspiration, and a renewed sense of purpose as we enter the Jewish New Year.

L'Shana Tova! May God bless you and yours in 5784.

HIGH HOLY DAYS WISH LIST

The High Holy Days season is a time when many people want to make special donations to our Temple. It is also a season in which our Temple has many extraordinary expenses. This year, we thought we would help potential donors by providing a list of some of the specific expenses incurred during Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. You can make the donation in honor or memory of a loved one, and, if you so wish, your donation will be acknowledged during services on the High Holy Days.

If you would like to assist Har Sinai Temple with any of these expenses, please contact the Temple office at (609) 730-8100. Please do not interpret this list as a limitation; if you would like to honor this season with a donation but for something not on the list, please let us know.

WISH LIST

Musicians: \$650 — We hire professionals to sing in the choir for Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. Our total cost is \$2,600.

Flowers: \$300 per holiday — We purchase fresh flowers for each holiday to beautify the bimah.

Rosh Hashanah Oneg/ Kiddush (In memory of Mike Rein): \$250 — We will gather for a festive Oneg/Kiddush following services on Rosh Hashanah morning.

Security: \$500/service — We hire security for each of our services. Our total budget for the holidays is \$2,500.

Technology: \$200 — We hire a technician to livestream each service. The total cost is \$1,000.

Tashlich: \$250 — This covers the cost of the food we provide when we gather for Tashlich.

Printing of the Yizkor Book of Memory: \$1,500 — Donate the cost of publishing our Book of Memory as a way of paying tribute to your deceased loved ones.
